In three short years, the Colorado Health Institute (CHI) has evolved from a vision statement crafted by its three founding foundations to a thriving information clearinghouse and respected source of analysis and strategic leadership in the health policy decisionmaking process. In 2005, CHI staff provided sound analysis to a broadening circle of constituents, including legislators, business leaders, state agencies, health care professionals, foundations and others seeking an independent, nonpartisan source of Colorado health and health care information.

As we look to our future, I am increasingly attuned to the importance of being relevant, responsive and accountable to the foundations that made a long-term commitment to support the CHI mission of "advancing"

In 2005, CHI made significant strides toward its goal of being a respected "go to" clearinghouse of national, state and local health-related information. Phase II of CHI's Web site was launched in 2005, making a growing array of health information accessible through its new and improved user-friendly navigational tools.

CHI inventoried dozens of national and state databases containing Colorado-specific health and health-related indicators, providing Web users easy access to online data. This compilation of resources will grow rapidly in 2006 and move CHI closer to its goal of serving as a trusted gateway for Coloradans to gain access to the health information they need.





In 2005, CHI sought to untangle and reveal the real story behind a global statistic. In 2002-03, Colorado ranked last among states for childhood immunizations. CHI's analysis of this ranking uncovered the reasons behind the statistic and got the attention of more than a dozen media outlets across the state, as well as health and health care leaders.

In addition, an update of its 2004 data bulletin on the uninsured in Colorado was released in time to assist legislators in understanding the problem and identifying solutions. CHI staff dug deep into the data to identify factors that put Coloradans at risk of being uninsured. Because such a large number of uninsured adults in Colorado are employed, a supplement on employment was added to the bulletin in 2006.







CHI produced an oral health environmental scan for a funding collaborative including the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment, The Colorado Trust, Rose Community Foundation, HealthONE Alliance (now the Colorado Health Foundation) and Delta Dental of Colorado Foundation. The project identified best practices, inventoried Colorado oral health initiatives, examined the oral health status of Coloradans and reported on the utilization of publicly funded programs.

The health care safety net is an integral element of Colorado's health care delivery system, serving roughly 25 percent of the state's population. With funding from the Colorado Health Foundation, CHI initiated a process to describe and monitor the safety net and the populations it serves. CHI will integrate the safety monitoring system into its ongoing core functions to serve as a readily available resource to policymakers in the public and private sectors.

Funding from The Colorado Trust is enabling CHI to build and maintain a comprehensive health professions workforce database. This database will inform policymakers and the philanthropic community about workforce issues as they relate to the supply and demand for health professionals in Colorado's communities.


"The Colorado Health Institute has been an exceptional resource for the Colorado Primary Care Office (PCO). Using their staff expertise, the PCO was able to complete two important projects that have been on the back burner for several years. CHI developed a database of primary care physicians and dentists...which will enable us to create reports that provide a clearer picture of health care provided to the low-income population. Without the assistance of CHI, the data most likely would never have been entered into a system for analysis."

"CHI's work on oral health is groundbreaking for Colorado. I don't think we funders had any idea how much activity was occurring. The data review was helpful to ground all of our thinking on what really needs to be done. In fact, since the Oral Health Project was completed, there is a growing amount of activity in the oral health arena, and funding partnerships are flourishing. I do not believe these partnerships would have happened without the momentum the Oral Health Project provided."

"The staff at CHI is thorough. I am most hopeful that the ClinicNet Data Assessment Project will bring the clinics closer together and place us in a position to be stronger voices for the medically underserved, and help us advocate to the funding community for our technology needs. CHI's assessment of the needs of the clinics around the state brings many small voices together into one louder and more consistent voice. As part of a group of clinics talking about similar needs, we will share our knowledge and hopefully avoid mistakes.

"[CHI's] safety net project is really exciting. If we begin to understand the motivations, needs and access issues of the people we serve, then it will become apparent how we can use Colorado's health care dollars to meet these needs. We spend lots of time talking about the problems, but CHI is positioning itself to talk about the solutions."

The number of opportunities for learning from others, sharing experiences and brainstorming solutions increased in 2005. CHI made numerous presentations to and/or collaborated with a variety of groups across the state, including the legislature, state and local agencies, the business and health care sectors, and local communities.

The Hot Issues in Health Care luncheon series drew nearly 300 attendees, including legislators, their staffs and other policy leaders, to learn about Medicaid and long- term care, the preferred drug list and the small group market. Other presentations focused on issues such as reinsurance, Colorado's uninsured population, auto insurance, health indicators, immunization and Medicare Part D.
